CGEMC Provides Value for Your Energy Dollars

Central Georgia EMC (CGEMC) continues to provide electricity at a great value. The Georgia Public Service Commission (PSC) recently released its Summer 2016 Residential Rate Survey, which shows that CGEMC continues to rank as one of the lowest-cost energy providers out of the 94 electric providers throughout the state.

Central Georgia EMC is the lowest-priced cooperative provider at the 2,000 kilowatt-hour (kWh) level. CGEMC customer-owners pay \$87.39 less than Georgia Power Co. consumers and \$55.95 less than the state average for their power at the 2,000-kWh level.

In addition, CGEMC was the fifth lowest at the 1,500-kWh level, saving customer-owners an average of \$55.27 over Georgia Power and \$37.48 as compared to the state average.

Providing our customers with the highest level of service at the lowest practicable rates is a mission our Board of Directors, staff, and employees take seriously. CGEMC has remained among the lowest-cost providers throughout the state since 2012, proof of our dedication to our mission and our customer-owners.





Pepper Steak, Hightower Style

Ingredients:

2 pounds lean beef round steak, cut into strips

Two teaspoons garlic powder

1/2 teaspoon pepper

1/2 cup water

2 cups vegetable juice

1 cup of sliced onion

Two medium bell peppers, seeded and cut into strips

Two large tomatoes, cut into wedges Salt, to taste

3 cups hot cooked rice

Directions:

Heat drizzle of olive oil in large pan; brown the steak. Add garlic powder, water, vegetable juice, onion, salt, and pepper. Cover and simmer 30 minutes until meat is tender. Gently stir in bell peppers and tomato wedges. Cook 10 minutes until peppers are tender. Serve over hot rice. Yields six servings.

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Energy Vampires Are Lurking in Your Home

This Halloween, the hungry little vampires who ring your doorbell are not the only ones who may visit your home. Energy vampires may already be inside, sucking electricity right out of the wires!





Energy vampires are appliances and electron-

ic devices that remain plugged in when not in use. Even turned off, they still consume small amounts of energy. In fact, they can add 10 percent or more to your monthly electric bill.

So when you turn something off, unplug the device or appliance, if possible. Some appliances, like your refrigerator or clocks, require constant energy. Here are a few devices that waste energy when plugged in but not in use:

Chargers. You have one for your phone, your tablet, your portable speaker, your iPod, and what else? When the device fully charges but remains plugged in, energy use will continue. If you unplug the device from the charger but leave the charger plugged in, the charger continues to waste electricity.

Computers. Your home office equipment, like the computer, printer, and scanner, does not need to stay on all the time. Turn them off and unplug them when you are finished using them for the day.

Need help remembering to unplug these items? Connect several devices using a power strip. Power strips allow the user to cut power to multiple devices at once. Unplug anything you rarely use, like the TV in the basement or the old stereo you have not turned on since you started downloading music. These small adjustments will banish those energy vampires, conserve energy, and lower your electric bill.
